DAVID'S JOURNEY - CONTINUES

In the early 1990s, while having been a practicing Catholic, I had a disagreement with a Catholic priest. I put aside principles I'd grown up with by mounting a private war with the Church – disregarding the 'message' and blaming it on one if its 'messengers'. One day, somebody lent me a book about a major Catholic pilgrimage centre in Europe – and in my curiosity, I decided to take a trip there 'because I needed a holiday'.

I found that half the group I travelled from Australia with were devotees of the writings of Maria Valtorta (I'd never heard of her before), and during my visit

there I began a reversion (not a conversion) process back to the Catholic Church I had abandoned.

Back in Australia I decided to read the five volumes of Maria Valtorta's *The Poem of the Man-God*, which described her 'taken back in time' descriptions of the lives of Jesus and Mary. This took me nine months, and it was followed by a second reading, which took six months. As a university academic engaged in research, I took copious notes, and realising that Maria's writings were comprehensive and Bible-centred, I wondered if anybody had attempted to cross-reference these writings with Scripture.

Subsequently, I discovered a document produced by the Abbot of a monastery in Atlanta in the U.S.A., cross-referencing many of the hundreds of passages from *The Poem* to Scripture. I remember raising my hands with a cry of joy at the time, finding that somebody had taken a step to begin this process. Believing that this person seemed to be only scratching the surface of a much larger undertaking, and not knowing of any other attempts at this process, I decided **to attempt it myself**. This threw me into an examination of every passage from Maria's writings, which might relate to a Bible passage from the many books of both the Old and the New Testaments.

A first outcome of this massive task was the production of the first edition of *A Pilgrim's Guide to Maria Valtorta's The Poem of the Man-God.* Among other sections, its two main chapters were 'Poem to Scripture', and 'Scripture to Poem'. Surprisingly, there were as many passages relating to the Old Testament as to the New – that was the Scripture that believers of those times knew and practised.

Following three subsequent editions of the *Pilgrim's Guide* (the fourth edition in 2002 ran to 185 pages), I found that about 98.5% of all the 4-Gospel passages relating to the lives of Jesus and Mary were actually witnessed and recorded by Maria Valtorta — often

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described in much greater detail, something like comparing snapshots with video recordings. In all, some 70,000 passages from Scripture were cross-referenced to the particular pages of Maria's writings. And with careful diligence in the process, I discovered no conflict between the Scripture passages identified, and Maria Valtorta's descriptions.

In 2013, after the Italian publishers had replaced *The Poem* with a new, 10-volume edition entitled *The Gospel as Revealed to Me*, I converted the volume and page numbers from *The Pilgrim's Guide...* to a Guide's new 185-page edition entitled *Where Is It?*, a Guide to Maria Valtorta's The Gospel as Revealed to Me.

[During the latter years of this major undertaking, having studied all the six other books of Maria's writings (her *Autobiography*, her *1943*, *1944* and *1945-50 Notebooks*, *The Book of Azariah* (Maria's Guardian Angel), and the *Holy Spirit's Lessons on the Epistle of St. Paul to the Romans*), I completed a companion cross-referencing publication relating to these works, entitled *A Reader's Guide to Maria Valtorta's Other Writings*. Its second edition of 136 pages, published in 2010, includes two main chapters: 'Scripture to Books', and 'Books to Scripture'.

Finally, I ask devotees of Maria's writings who have discovered errors in any of these Guides, to pass them on to Catherine Loft. I thank you in advance, and bless you, for doing this.

CATHERINE'S CLASSROOM

Dear Maria Valtorta Readers.

Teachers have always put in long hours. Not just the ones visible to the public – contact hours from 8:30 a.m. - 3.30 p.m. - but all the hours in the evening and on weekends preparing classes and marking endless papers. The situation has worsened in the last few years in some ways because personal computers are used constantly in the classroom, which has meant that students have email access to their teachers on work-related concerns after school hours. How could students not think otherwise when shops are open very late, and 24/7 in many cases. Trouble is, I was getting emails weekdays and nights up until midnight, and also on weekends. What were they doing up at that hour? It got to the stage where I informed students that I would not read any emails after 9:00 p.m. and never on a Sunday. I have been doing this for the last two years. I proceeded to inform them that not only was I aware of the commandment which said, 'Keep Holy the Sabbath Day' but I had re-read the passage about this from Maria Valtorta's 1943 Notebooks in Jesus' own words. Students are constantly tired and stressed. I knew it was the right time to share this with them. I gave them a hard copy of the following excerpt but I also read it to them to make sure the tone, the emphasis and the outpouring of love were evident too. Jesus says: 'You should always, I repeat, bear Me in mind whatever you do; but since you are unable to work while keeping your spirits fixed in God, once a week stop working so as to think of God alone.

'This, which may seem to you to be a servile law, is instead proof of how God loves you. Your good Father knows that you are fragile machines that wear out in continuous use and has provided for your flesh (for it too, since it is also His work) by giving you the command to have it rest one day out of every seven to give it proper repose. God does not want your illnesses. [...] And it is blameworthy imprudence to want to force your being towards constant work for gain [...] On that day of rest which God has placed in the week - and He gave you His example of rest; consider: He, the infinite Agent, the Generator who from Himself generates Himself continuously - He has shown you the need for rest; He did so for you, to be your Teacher in life. And do you, insignificant powers, want not to take this into account, almost as if you were more powerful than God? On that day of rest for your flesh which is broken under excessive fatigue, manage to occupy yourselves with the rights and duties of the soul. The rights - to true Life. The soul dies if it is kept separated from God. Give Sunday to your souls - since you are unable to do so every day and every hour - so that on Sunday the soul may feed on the Word of God, may be filled with God, so as to have vitality during the other days of work. Rest is so sweet in his Father's house for a son whom work has kept distant for a whole week! And why don't you give this sweetness to your souls?' Who could have said it better!

When I first came across the writings of Maria Valtorta's *The Book of Azariah*, I was a bit confused. I knew it had to do with Maria Valtorta's Guardian Angel, Azariah, giving explanations of the readings at Sunday Mass, but the list of biblical passages at the top of the page left me wondering. So I thought I would approach this book by looking up all the references of each Mass listed first, then I would read Azariah's commentary and get a better understanding of it. However, I still wondered why so many of these were not read out at my regular Mass on Sunday. They were so beautiful!

When I asked a friend, I was informed that this book relates to the Tridentine Mass (Latin) and not the Novus Ordo (post Vatican II). This clarified the situation as I did not grow up in the Latin Mass era but I was still curious and drawn to it. So I attended the Latin Mass and it was a truly incredible spiritual experience. I followed the missal (looking at the

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English column, of course) and truly appreciated all the passages. This Mass makes it so much easier to capture the full essence of *The Book of Azariah* which I recommend you read on a weekly basis after each Mass (saves all the looking up). STEPHEN'S UPDATE

Dear Valtorta Readers.

I have some good news! If you might recall in our Dec. 2014, March 2016, and June 2017 bulletins, we gave some updates on the English translation of Jean-François Lavère's highly-anticipated book, entitled *L'énigme Valtorta*, *Une Vie de Jésus Romancée?* (*The Valtorta Enigma, a Fictionalized Life of Jesus?*). Jean-François Lavère, a professional engineer, wrote this groundbreaking scientific study into Valtorta's primary work. He and his publisher gave the Maria Valtorta Readers' Group permission to provide the English translation of this work in its entirety to visitors.

Jean-François Lavère has been studying the works of Maria Valtorta for 25 years. Convinced that the historicity of Maria Valtorta's work would either prove itself, or show itself to be wrong, he undertook a systematic study of thousands of details provided in her work. All that, a half century ago: from the depth of her bed of suffering, without documentation and with no connection to a scientific community, this woman "sees" in real time and by a kind of shortcut: describing what some scholars would much later laboriously deduce archeological data two thousand years old! Names of villages in Aramea, cities and monuments that disappeared and then are found again today, a knowledge of manners and customs, of scenery, attire...a whole context whereby the author of this Work amply demonstrates that this tour de force is impossible if one leaves no place for what the "seer" herself affirms: it is God who shows her, it is Jesus who dictates to her the instructions which accompany [His] illustrating the Gospels without ever betraying them: in their cultural context and often with moving poetry, consecrating the union of the True, of the Good, and of the Beautiful which rises from Christ like water from its source.'
